MAYOR'S MINUTE

Census workers will begin their in-field canvassing to compile an accurate list of the residential addresses in the City of Columbia to assist in the nation's 2020 Census. April 1, 2020 is Census Day. Field work canvassing will begin on Monday, August 19th and is expected to be completed no later than October 4th. Census workers will be present throughout the city during daylight hours and will be carrying a laptop. Census worker's will have a picture badge for identification purposes.

Officially updating our population with the U.S. Census Bureau means that the City will see an increase in certain tax revenues that are distributed based on population. Your participation will result in increased funding for improvements within our community. Please give census workers your full cooperation when they visit so Columbia can get an accurate count of its residents at next year's census.

CITY OF COLUMBIA ANNOUNCES NEW CITY ADMINISTRATOR

DOUGLAS R. BRIMM

We are pleased to announce that Douglas "Doug" Brimm has been selected by the Mayor and City Council to be Columbia's next City Administrator with an anticipated starting date of September 9th.

Brimm, a Dupo native, brings 10 years of local government management experience to the City of Columbia. For the past 7 years, he has served as the first City Administrator for the City of Trenton, Illinois where he worked to oversee construction of a new wastewater treatment plant, revitalized the City's economic development efforts, and modernized City government. He previously held the position of Management Analyst for the City of Collinsville, Illinois. Brimm holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and a Master of Public Administration and Policy Analysis Degree from Southern Illinois University Edwardsville.



Currently, he resides in Trenton with his wife, Alicia, and three children, Leah, Charlie, and Hannah. They plan to relocate to Columbia.

Distracted Driving Penalties Enforced

A law that was recently passed increased all minor traffic offense fines to \$164 under the Illinois Vehicle Code effective July 1, 2019. This includes speeding and disobeying traffic control devices. This new law includes harsher penalties for using electronic control devices while driving. Previously, "distracted driving" was only a non-moving violation offense; however, under the new law it is now a moving violation.

Furthermore, if a driver receives three violations, it results in an automatic driver's license suspension.



Traffic crashes are rarely random or chance incidents and occur because of identifiable sequences of behavioral activities. Distracted driving is a major cause of traffic crashes. The top five major distracted driving events are:

- 1) Generally distracted or "lost in thought"
- 2) Cell phone or electronic device usage (e.g. sending text or emails, searching online resources)
- 3) Other person or object inside the car with the driver such as people passengers, pet passengers, or unsecured objects
- 4) Reaching for items (e.g. radio controls, in-car electronics, sunglasses)
- 5) Eating or drinking while driving

By staying focused on the roadway, you ensure a safer route for yourself, your passengers, and fellow motorists.



Reminder

City residents may now register for yard and garage sales online at www.columbiaillinois.com/yardsales. There is no charge and no permit necessary to have a sale, but residents are limited to three sales per year. We are pleased to provide you with this simple, digital registration experience which will allow you to register your sale from the comfort of your own home! Sales may be entered any time before your sale begins. There is no deadline; however, it may take up to two business days for your sale to be approved and added to the site. Please double check that you have entered the correct sale dates before submitting your information.

Anyone can check online 24/7 to see and print a list of upcoming sales at the same link found above.

LIMB AND LEAF PICK UP

The limb pick up service for Fall 2019 will take place the weeks beginning October 7 and October 14. If you have limbs to be picked up, please have them by the curb in front of your residence by 6:00 a.m. on either Monday, October 7 or Monday, October 14. The service **will not** pick up piles that contain honeysuckle, vines, or landscape waste such as grass clippings or bushes.

The leaf pick up service will begin in October and continue into December (exact dates TBD). You may place your leaves by the curb, but not in the street at any time. Continual sweeps will be made through the city to pick up the leaves. It is recommended (if possible) you cover the pile(s) of leaves so they do not get wet which makes the leaves difficult to pick up. Piles of leaves shall be free of honeysuckle, grass clippings, limbs, branches and twigs, acorns, gumballs or anything other than leaves. The leaf vacuums cannot pick up these types of items. As we get closer to these dates, additional reminders and information will be posted on the City website, City's Facebook page, at City Hall, and on utility billing notices.


