Quarry Road Roundabout is Complete

The Quarry Road Roundabout and Resurfacing Project is complete and open to traffic! A couple of reminders regarding Columbia's first roundabout. When you approach a roundabout you should slow down, look for signs and pavement markings prohibiting certain movements, and enter the roundabout by turning right when safe to do so. When exiting the roundabout, use your right turn signal to let other drivers know in advance.

It is hoped that the residents of the City of Columbia will enjoy these additions to our transportation and trail network. The city would like to thank the residents, businesses, and motorists for their cooperation and patience during construction. The city also wants to thank Baxmeyer Construction for their willingness to work with the city and residents during the project. Then finally a big thanks to the Department of Public Works, Columbia Police Department, and Assistant City Engineer Tim Ahrens for their work on the project.



EMS Celebrates 50 Years

Long gone are the days when funeral homes and volunteers operated the ambulance service. In 1972, Columbia began staffing ambulance systems with the latest life-saving equipment running a mere 200 calls a year on a minuscule \$25,000 budget. Here we are in 2022... with our 6 full time, 18 part-time expertly trained Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians handling a projected 1,650 calls. We are fortunate to have a 2008, 2019, and 2021 ambulances and now a 2021 Tahoe. This newest addition is a fully stocked advanced life support vehicle staffed with a paramedic to provide a quick response to patient's needs when the ambulances are out on calls.

The Tahoe will add more resources to Columbia during the day as well as providing advanced care at our city's special events. Thanks for your support Columbia!

Stay Safe This Fall

The Columbia Police Department would like to wish our local students and school staff an amazing 2022-2023 year. Pictured is our new School Resource Officer Joe Roach, who will be rotating through the different schools maintaining close partnerships with school administrators, staff and students in order to provide a safe school environment. Additionally, our department would like to remind new and seasoned drivers of a few school safety tips to help everyone stay safe throughout the school year.



1. Be aware of our designated school zones.
2. Expect increased traffic in school zones and plan to leave early to your destinations on time.
3. Always reduce your driving speed in school zones.
4. Remember that cell phone use is not allowed in school zones. Phone calls or texts can wait.
5. Be aware of our pedestrian crosswalks. Stop your vehicle and allow pedestrians to safely cross.
6. Be cautious and courteous to our bus drivers. It is illegal to pass a stopped school bus that has a stop sign extended and their lights on. Stop your vehicles an appropriate distance away during loading and unloading of school buses.

Must have piles of limbs-no whole trees, free of grass, acorns, and gumballs placed by curb by 6 am.

Leaf Pickup - mid-Oct. through mid-Dec.
Continual sweeps will be made during period.
Place leaf piles (free of grass clippings, gumballs, limbs acorns) by the curb.
