Columbia Hosts Sister City Delegation

Thirty-four visitors from Columbia's Sister City of Gedern, Germany arrived on September 16th for an 11-day visit. The Sister Cities of Gedern and Columbia alternate hosting the official visit every two years. Members of the delegation eagerly anticipated this visit, which was postponed last year due to the pandemic. Visitors learned about the culture, history and day-to-day American life by staying with host families. They began their week with a "catch-your-pancake" breakfast and giggles from everyone. Columbia's Fire, Police and Emergency Medical Services Departments hosted an open house, complete with rides in a fire truck and up-close tours of our state-of-the-art ambulances. Visitors toured the Monroe County History Museum, went apple-picking at Eckert's and tasted locally-produced bourbon at Stumpy's Spirits and Distillery. The group toured St. Louis sights, including the Fox Theater and Busch Stadium. Hosts and guests enjoyed planning their own outings together on free days. This was the Gedern delegation's 8th visit to Columbia since 1993. We will celebrate the 30th anniversary of our partnership with an official visit to Gedern next fall.

New Roundabout Announced

The City of Columbia has been awarded \$1.2 million to build our community's second roundabout at the intersection of Old IL 3/Quarry Road/Ghent Road. The project will be funded by the Illinois Department of Transportation's Highway Safety Improvement Program. Project design should begin in 2023 with construction anticipated to be complete in 2024.

New Trail Projects Completed

Christ Brothers Asphalt, Inc. has completed the 2022 Walking Trail Project. The project resurfaced 1.7 miles of paved recreational trails in Bolm-Schuhkraft Park and Admiral Trost Park. The project also reconstructed approximately 635 feet of the GM&O Trail near Quarry Road.

Driving Safety

Winter Weather Driving

In an effort to keep residents safe during winter driving, the Columbia Police Department is sharing the following tips from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

1. Check the weather before you leave. Assess the road conditions and traffic.
2. Always remain vigilant while driving.
3. Drive slowly in the winter. It takes longer to slow your vehicle on a icy, wet or snowy surface.
4. Allocate extra time for travel during the winter to compensate for driving more slowly. Do not rush or put yourself in a situation where you feel pressure to rush or speed.
5. Stock your vehicle with the supplies you need to drive safely and stay warm in an emergency during the winter, including: broom and/or ice scraper, flashlight, jumper cables, warning devices (flares, emergency markers), blankets, cell phone charger, water and food.
6. Check the inflation pressure of your tires because the cold temperatures can cause the pressure to drop. Make sure your pressure meets the manufacturer's recommended inflation pressure.
7. Make sure your defrosters and windshield wipers work properly. It is imperative to replace the blades if they have become worn.

City Prepares Early for Winter Weather

The Department of Public Works is already thinking about winter weather and snow removal activities. There are certain things to keep in mind about the Public Works Department performing their snow removal activities. Here are a few highlights...



When snow is forecast, if at all possible please remove vehicles from the streets and roadways. In some areas with parked vehicles on the streets and roadways attempting to navigate a large truck with a snow plow and salt spreader is nearly impossible. The more working room allowed for the trucks and equipment the faster the snow removal activities can take place.

- Please make sure basketball goals and other obstructions are not placed in or adjacent to the street. They pose a hazard to snow plowing crews and to the traveling public.
- Please do not push or throw snow from drives and walks into the street. This is just extra snow to manage plus it may result in calls to the Public Works Department to remove a potential hazard in the street or roadway meaning other snow removal activities have to be put on hold to take care of the potential hazard.
- During a heavy snowfall event, the Public Works Department's first priority is to keep the more heavily traveled streets and roadways open. Secondary and subdivision streets will be accomplished as snow removal activities continue and the rate of snowfall starts to subside. Plowing and removing snow in cul-de-sac areas is time consuming and tedious and takes away from other snow removal activities. Cul-de-sac areas are one of the last areas to be fully cleared of snow.
- Property owners are responsible for cleaning their driveway approaches and around mailboxes. Snow plowing operations may inconvenience property owners when snow is plowed in front of driveways and mailboxes. However, we cannot respond to requests to clear driveways or mailboxes. Our priority is keeping roads open for emergency service providers.
